# ABC Music and Me Program at O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Head Start Centers

O.C.E.A.N., Inc's classroom teachers believe in the power of music to engage the pre-school children at the O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Head Start Centers and understand the impact music can have on young children's development of language and early literacy. During the spring of 2011, the agency submitted a grant through the ABC Music and Me Charitable Gift Program (Kindermusik International) to provide what the agency and scientific research have supported for years which is to use music and musical instruction to build upon early literacy skills.

O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Head Start was awarded a grant including one year's worth of curriculum materials and on-site professional development, valued at \$15,000. The grant award included classroom kits and home materials for the agency to establish a new music program. The new program also encourages the parents to be involved with their children at home through the use of take-home kits. With one program two priorities are met including the musical education of the child and the parent's ability to develop musical goals for themselves and their children at the home.

Stop, drop and roll is a simple fire safety technique taught to the O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Head Start students by Paul Baumgarten, O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Transportation Manager and a firefighter from East Dover Station 28. Primarily it is a method to extinguish a fire on a person's clothes or hair without, or in addition to, the use of conventional firefighting equipment. In addition to extinguishing the fire, stop, drop and roll is an effective psychological tool used particularly with children to provide a routine that can be used to focus on in order to avoid panic. •

# ABC Music and Me Program at O.C.E.A.N., Inc.

The materials included with ABC Music and Me Program help the agency teachers create a printrich classroom environment. Each unit includes a story and song lyrics that are used to call children's attention to concepts of print. Writing activities included with each unit engage the Head Start students in independent writing and home-based writing activities to engage further in developing their awareness of print and early writing skills.

In addition to the lesson plans for the classrooms, the program provides information for even greater success with children who have special needs. The home resource units are also available in Spanish to engage Head Start families who speak Spanish as a home language.


As part of the grant award, instructors from the ABC Music and Me Program traveled from Greensboro, North Carolina to train the O.C.E.A.N., Inc. teachers utilizing a "Train-the-Trainer" concept. As a result of training, the teachers reviewed high-quality experimental studies conducted in the classroom with the students as they received their music education that focused on the impact of musical instruction on the brain.

The musical instruction on the students are examined in the following areas: Reading, Comprehension and Verbal Memory, Listening Skills, Vocabulary for English Language Learners, Phonological and Phonemic Awareness, Writing and Print awareness, impact on children with disabilities and family involvement.

"The Train-the Trainer professional development ensures longevity of the O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Head Start Music program," said Ted Gooding, O.C.E.A.N., Inc. President/CEO. "Through this concept, we were able to train our staff and self-sustain the O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Head Start Music Program into future years."

"Understanding that children learn differently, we already see our children benefiting from the music program through improvement of their gross motor skills including dance and movement for whole body learners; songs, clapping, and rhythm for musical learners; and rhymes and letter exercises for our language lovers said Donna Doherty, O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Head Start Director." •



# Finding a way back after difficult times.....O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Housing makes a difference in the lives of others!

In these difficult times due to the state of the economy, many individuals and families are having problems keeping their head above water. This was no exception for Na'Eem Stout, a tenant at the O.C.E.A.N., Inc. Stonehurst Condo Complex in Freehold Township, New Jersey. Prior to entering into permanent housing with O.C.E.A.N., Inc., Na'Eem was facing problems after he was hurt on his job as a subcontracted assembler. "I ended up losing everything," Na'Eem said explaining that he stayed in the Freehold Clergy Association Emergency Housing Program throughout the winter of 2009-2010 after he became homeless.

The Freehold Clergy Associations Emergency
Housing Program offers shelter to those in need at
very trying times in their lives. It allows
participants an opportunity to re-group, to get back
on track and to move toward a better place in life.
By February of that same year, Stan Rosenthal, the
coordinator of Freehold Clergy Association began
working with Heather Matos, the O.C.E.A.N., Inc.
Facilities Manager to help Na'Eem get back on his
feet as both began connecting him with supportive
services and permanent housing at Stonehurst.

"I've had a real good experience with O.C.E.A.N., Inc." said Na'Eem. "The agency did a lot of things for me that I did not expect to get. Heather Matos worked with me through thick and thin. She had a lot of patience and empathy and stuck by me 110% throughout the process of obtaining my apartment at Stonehurst. This program is a blessing to those who can get permanent housing through this program."

"NaEem is the reason this program was created," said Heather Matos. "He is an individual that fell on hard times and needed guidance and direction to get back on track. Once he was lead in the right direction and obtained a stable roof over his head, he was able to strive towards meeting his full potential. Na'Eem is taking classes to obtain his

Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor Certification (CADC) so he may counsel others to overcome their addictions. He also regularly volunteers at his former day program at St. Peters in Freehold to give back to the people who helped him get where he is today. He has worked hard to get to this point and now the sky's the limit."

"These types of programs with supportive services are very necessary especially since no one is too far from homelessness," said Na'Eem. "You never know where you will be in the next 5-10 years. I know that people get discouraged when they see the waiting list for permanent housing but they need to stick with it and continue moving towards bettering themselves." •

# Gravy 101

If fears of lumps and grease seize you at the stove each thanksgiving, make a foolproof sauce



Baste and Watch—Flavorful pan drippings from turkey are the foundation of good gravy. Baste often, adding 1/2 cup dry white wine 30 minutes into roasting the bird. Check the pan often to make sure the fats and juices aren't burning; add more liquid as needed.

Make a Simple Stock—As the turkey roasts, combine 1 turkey neck, 1 celery stalk, 1 carrot, 1/2 onion, 10 black peppercorns and a bundle of herbs in a large saucepan. Add 8 cups of water, bring to a boil and reduce heat and simmer.

Make a Slurry—Combine 1/4 cup all-purpose flour and 1 cup stock in a large jar. This mixture, called a slurry, will thicken the gravy without making it lumpy.

Shake the Slurry—Close the lid and shake vigorously until all the flour is incorporated into the stock and no lumps remain.

Separate Fat and Juices—Pour roasting-pan drippings into a fat separator. Let the fat rise above the juices, about 10 minutes to have at least one cup.

Deglaze the Pan—Meanwhile, set roasting pan across 2 burners. Pour in 1/2 cup dry white wine. Bring to a boil over medium high heat, scraping up browned bits using a wooded spoon.

Whisk—Whisk in slurry and remaining stock.

Pour separated juices into pan, leaving fat behind. Bring to a boil. Cook, whisking until thickened, 12 to 13 minutes.

Finish the Gravy—Strain the gravy through a fine sifter. Season with course salt and freshly ground pepper. Makes 1 3/4 cups.
